Weekly LRS Governors Focus

Over the coming term each of our hardworking and dedicated Governors will be writing an article in the newsletter to let you know a little bit about themselves and their role on the Governing Body.

Sandy Mercado Governor Specialist Area: Teaching & Learning

Before retiring in December 2010 I spent

22 years working in Further Education. I began as a lecturer in Sociology, Politics and History and by the time I left I had moved into management. At the time of my retirement I was Head of Faculty with extensive responsibility for a large number of staff and a wide range of courses in A level, BTEC and NVQ as well as a very thriving adult education department. I liaised with local high schools and also two local universities. I lead a team of managers who were responsible for overseeing the departments which made up the Faculty. It was a very demanding job but despite the long hours and stress it was also enjoyable - which is easier to say now than it was then! As a result I found retirement just a little guiet and by 2011 I had started

voluntary work at Watford General Hospital, initially in the Maternity Department and subsequently on the children's ward as part of a team working with parents of sick children.

When I was approached and asked if I would like to be a school governor I was both thrilled and intimidated. I obviously had considerable experience of the Further Education system but knew little about Primary Education. The closest I came to primary school was my granddaughter who had just started in Year 1. But I had a desire to be back in an educational environment. I believe fervently in the importance of a sound education as builder of confidence and a provider of opportunities for young people. My experience in the Further Education sector and, more recently, watching my granddaughter's progress at school, has convinced me that those earliest years in education are the most crucial. Primary education is the foundation upon which a successful education career is based.

So, I joined the governing body of Little Reddings School in September 2015 and found I had quite a steep learning curve ahead of me. But my fellow governors have been tremendously supportive and patient with my frequent questions. I am currently a member of the **Teaching and Learning subcommittee**. This committee examines the performance of teachers and their professional development.





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The committee also scrutinises the School Development Plan and reviews school policies. We analyse children's achievement and receive regular reports from the Head Teacher on progress and activities in the school.

My Link Governor role during 2015/2016 was to liaise with a member of staff responsible for the Cornerstones Project. This project was a new initiative to integrate learning into exciting and challenging activities that inspired the children's' involvement, imagination and curiosity. I visited the school to meet the lead teacher and also to visit classes and see how the project was working. I was able to meet children from all year groups who told me about their work on these projects. I also supported class activities when a visiting artist came to work on art and science projects with the children. On another occasion I joined a lively group of Year 1 children on a walk to the Rose Garden in Bushey where they enjoyed a very active morning engaged in a number of tasks and activities organised by a member of the Rose Garden staff.

I am thoroughly enjoying my developing relationship with Little Reddings and am very proud of "my school" as I like to think of it. I am impressed with the vitality and professionalism of the teaching staff and have been delighted with the children I have met during my visits. I look forward to contributing to the school's continuing development and success throughout the rest of this academic year and beyond. Sandy Mercado

John Hastie Governor Specialist Area: Finance

I'm John Hastie and I'm a community governor. I'm also on the governing body at Bushey Meads school, and have previous experience as a chair of governors at a junior school in Watford. I have a daughter in the sixth form at Bushey Meads and another in her first year at university. I chair the Finance & Resources committee which for the first time this year is a single committee across both Little Reddings and Bushey Meads.

As well as the finance and budgeting, our committee also looks at staffing, premises and facilities. Every year the full governing body has to approve the budget that the headteacher puts forward before it is submitted to the government. Our committee examines the budget, and asks questions in detail before making a recommendation to the full governing body for approval.

While everyone understands the need for great teachers and teaching assistants, their efforts are further enhanced by excellent non-teaching staff, good buildings and systems that support improvement. It has been good to see the progress in ICT provision since being part of the trust, and large projects such as the new





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facilities for the reception classes, and improvements to the nursery. The school really befits from sharing premises staff with a secondary school. At the end of our last committee meeting we looked around the school and saw the fantastic new reading corners in the classrooms.

Why do we do this? Looking at accounts and budgets isn't the most exciting thing you can do on a Monday evening! A stable financial future underpins Miss Simmonds and the senior leadership team's goal of whole school improvement and allows longer term plans to be implemented while making the site a brighter place for pupils, staff and parents. 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
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Writers Day
